Many have contributed toward the gathering of material for this History; have turned back pages in their own lives or those of their friends and brought forth stories of rare historical value, and always in a spirit of friendly interest and cooperation. The list is too long for special mention, but the following brief statement, at least should be made.

The first to suggest the writing of this History was Judge Bradfield and through the almost five years of its preparation has given unstintingly from his rich storehouse of historical data, and from start to finish has stood ready with counsel and advice of incalculable value; and at the last was the first to read and approve the finished manuscript.
